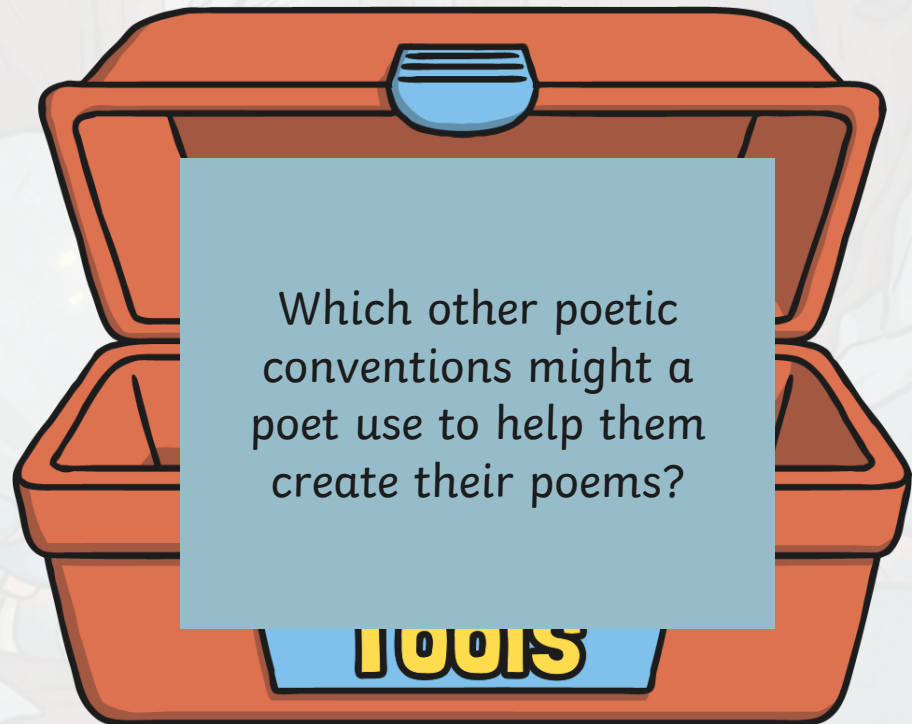
# Poetic Conventions
